

Pupil Premium Grant (PPG) 2018-19

At St. Luke's CE School, we aim to nurture our children, both academically and spiritually, in order to provide them with secure foundations for life-long learning. As pupils move through the school, we build upon these excellent foundations and aim to develop the children's resilience, a love of learning and a desire to achieve their full potential. In this way, we aim to ensure that our children are ready for secondary school and are on their journey to contributing to British society. At St. Luke's CE School, we have high aspirations and ambitions for our children and we are determined to ensure that our children are given every chance to realise their full potential.

Our Approach

Our key objective in using the Pupil Premium Grant is to ensure that disadvantaged pupils (pupils entitled to Free School Meals and Pupil Premium funding) make good progress and any differences in attainment and progress between groups are closed. As a school we consistently track all groups of pupils to ensure that they make good or better progress. Through targeted whole class teaching and interventions, we are working to eliminate barriers to learning and progress. Our disadvantaged pupils do well, showing the positive impact of the additional funding.

Funding has been ring-fenced and used to benefit all pupil premium pupils. We have established clear lines of responsibility with all members of the Senior Leadership Team (alongside all staff members) ensuring pupil premium pupils achieve well.

This has meant making informed decisions about our spending such as:

- * Ensuring that spending is directly linked to differences in achievement
- * Making use of our own assessment information to target whole class teaching and interventions
- * Making sure there is at least good teaching on a day to day basis

The Pupil Premium Strategy Statement below includes the details of how we continue to work to sustain good outcomes for all PP pupils and work hard to improve attendance for the small number of families where this is low and has the potential to impact on pupils' attainment, progress and wellbeing. The statement also reviews expenditure and the impact of this for 2017-18

The Government believes that the Pupil Premium, which is additional to main school funding, is the best way to address the current underlying inequalities between children eligible for Free School Meals and their peers by ensuring that this funding is used to tackle disadvantage and reaches the pupils who need it most.
