Spring Class



This week in Spring Class, we have been reading and performing the story of The Gingerbread Man. The children used their phonics knowledge to write the Gingerbread man's refrain and it is impressive to see both their perseverance with writing, and their growing understanding of how to write. They also enjoyed setting up puppet shows to tell the story and creating a roleplay theatre with tickets and security guards. In Maths this week, we have been working on understanding the meaning of mathematical symbols and how to use them to create number sentences based on word problems.









Summer Class



This week in Summer Class, we read 'Library Lion' and wrote our own predictions on how the story might end. In Maths, we revisited multiplication by focusing on the 2, 3, 5 and 10 times tables. In R.E., we explored the first (Shahada) and second (Salah) pillars of Islam, discussing how these pillars show commitment in the daily lives of Muslims. We also began learning about the Great Fire of London. We looked at the timeline of events and discussed how and why the fire spread so quickly.







Autumn Class



This week in Autumn Class, we have continued to enjoy reading our humour poems. We've been exploring different poetic structures and discussing the poetic features that authors use, such as rhyme, repetition, and alliteration. In Maths, we have been revising place value and practising how to order 3- and 4-digit numbers using number lines. In Art, we created viewfinders to help us focus on specific parts of the natural scenery. Using these, we selected and framed sections of the beautiful spring-green trees in the playground. We then began sketching these "snapshots," looking closely at shapes, lines, and textures to develop our observational drawing skills.





Winter Class



This week, Year 6 have been working hard to identify their own revision areas in preparation for their SATs tests in May. Year 5 have been working on area, perimeter and properties of shape in Maths, including finding the perimeters and areas of composite shapes. In English, they have been introduced to the graphic novel 'When Stars are Scattered'. Meanwhile, they have used the novel Holes, as a basis for writing a narrative from the point of view of a minor character. During the afternoons, we have completed our learning on the Easter story and how it relates to God's plan of salvation. In topic, we have used a short film to create our own version of a Viking myth. Our research on the Vikings is ongoing and we have been using this to create presentation slides.



Give your child the best start in life – every school day counts.



At St Luke's we believe that all children deserve an education of the highest quality in order to flourish and enjoy a life filled with meaning and purpose. To support us with this, we ask parents to ensure their children are in school and on time every day. The school gates are open at 8:50am and children should be in their classrooms to be registered at 9:00am. The latest statutory guidance for schools, **Keeping Children Safe in Education 2024**, has a specific paragraph addressing children who are absent from school.

Children who are absent from education

175. Children being absent from education for prolonged periods and/or on repeat occasions can act as a vital warning sign to a range of safeguarding issues including neglect, child ... exploitation - particularly county lines. It is important the school or college's response to persistently absent pupils and children missing education supports identifying such abuse, and in the case of absent pupils, helps prevent the risk of them becoming a child missing education in the future. This includes when problems are first emerging but also where children are already known to local authority children's social care and need a social worker (such as a child who is a child in need or who has a child protection plan, or is a looked after child), where being absent from education may increase known safeguarding risks within the family or in the community.

Our whole school attendance target is 96% which allows for 8 days of illness over the year.
